## CONFERENCE INFORMATION

#### **General Registration**

- Available to students in grades 3-8
- Register Online: www.swwc.org/yw
- · All attending adults must be registered online.
- There is no student/adult ratio at this time.
- Not required but prefer contact person be an attending adult.

#### **School Participants**

- Schools attending are responsible for collecting and entering registrations. Payments can be made online or see billing option below.
- If your school is unable to attend, direct parents to the website for access to conference information, giving them the chance to attend on their own.
- Please make sure parents sending students with the school are aware of the cancellation policy.

#### **Parent Participants**

- If a student is unable to attend, try to send someone in their place and notify us of the change.





### **El Holly** "Magic of Imagination"

El Holly loves to write, especially books full of adventure and whimsy. Finding Fae, the first book in the Finding Fae trilogy, was most recently a 2023 BookLife Prize Quarterfinalist. When she isn't writing, teaching, or "mom-ing," you can find her sipping on coffee or taking her dogs, Mack and Kevin, on walks in Minnesota. Her biggest passion is encouraging others to find their passion and joy, especially when it comes to unlocking the power of the imagination. She is a firm believer that with a little imagination, and a trusty pen and notebook, the sky's the limit! Or, as her characters in the Phantasmic Wars series say, "Imagination is key."





### SESSION DESCRIPTIONS

#### Select sessions appropriate for student's grade level 3-5 or 6-8

#### A. Plotting with Post-its Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

We all love Post-it Notes! They mostly help us remember things, but they can also be used to create a new story plot. In this class, we'll discuss what every plot needs, how to carry action from scene to scene, and why it's important to increase the tension from beginning to end. Students will use this technique to generate a unique story outline.

#### B. How to Write a Fantasy, Mystery or Anything Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

Students will choose what to write about. They will then work together on learning what makes a great story. These include WRITING THE FIRST SENTENCE: This is where you hook your reader, and STORY ELEMENTS: plot, suspense, characters, mood, villains, and heroes. Students may take notes, but this class is strong on sharing creative ideas. Even the most shy student has a story twist to share! \*Maggie Fuller

#### C. Creating Your Own Tall Tales Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

Bob will share some Paul Bunyan tales. Students will then work on creating their own tall tales using ideas for amazing adventures, awesome characters and colorful details. The outline they create will allow them to write a finished story back at school. \*Bob Gasch

#### D. Explore the Magic of Imagination Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

All it takes is a spark. Work with El Holly's guidance on techniques to spark ideas and get the creative juices flowing. You will leave the session with methods you can use on future stories, like the "what if" and "looking back" strategies. \*El Holly

#### E. Character Sketch Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

The Key to Great Characters! Good stories depend on believable characters. Create compelling individuals through the use of character sketches. Develop individuals of depth, appeal, and interest to include in stories by writing character history, personality, and appearance. Include backstory, even if not all elements appear in a story, these aspects allow a writer to become better acquainted with individual characters and envision how they may realistically interact in a novel or short story.

#### F. Writing TV News in an Hour Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

Television news, and now streaming news, is a fast-paced business. That's why we have to be able to collect information quickly and then write it even quicker. But that doesn't mean we can't be creative! We will gather news information and write a story together within 45 minutes. The type of story that could potentially find its way onto WCCO-TV!

#### G. Retold Fairy Tales: Making Old Stories New Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

What is a retold fairy tale? If you've seen the Shrek movies, "Aladdin," "The Little Mermaid," or almost any other Disney movie, you already know the answer: it's an old story with a new spin. In this session, you'll learn how to put your own twist on stories you THOUGHT you knew.

#### H. Midnight, The Darkest Part Of the Night to write a story!

Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

Students will be writing a crime/mystery story. The Zoo Man will tell the start of the story under a low light to set the stage. Characters will be introduced to the students. The students will then start and finish the short story with The Zoo Man's guidance. The story starts in a cornfield. The year 1969. #### I. The Art of Rap Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

How do you write to a beat? How do you put your ideas into rhyme? How do you make it sound so good?? Learn this and more from professional hip hop artist SEE MORE PERSPECTIVE in a crash course where you will write collaboratively to learn the basics of the worldwide phenomenon that is Hip Hop and the art of rap. \*SEE MORE PERSPECTIVE

#### J. Escape the Cold; Let's Go to the Garden! Gr. 6-8

Students will plan their own garden or meal and draft a literary escape filled with sensory details. Participants will be guided by writing prompts after learning about the author's garden in Perennial Ceremony: Lessons and Gifts from a Dakota Garden. \*Teresa Peterson

#### K. Sing a Story Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

As a group we will brainstorm to create a story and turn it into a song. Bring your ideas. We will walk through some steps on how to get started and line by line we will generate lyrics that rhyme or just tell a story. Students are welcome to create their own song story too. We will include guitar music to set the tone for the songs. The best thing is, with practice, when you start getting better at it, IT's FUN!! \*Charlie Roth

#### L. Deadline: Welcome to the News Desk! Gr. 3-5 & 6-8

You're a reporter on the first day of the job. Breaking news happens. Will you be able to gather the facts, put together a good news story, and get it ready by the deadline? Students will learn the basics of news judgment, how to gather information, how to structure a news story quickly and accurately, and edit down reporting and getting it ready for publishing. They'll also learn about good sources v. fake sources, media literacy and how to work together as a newsroom. Remember, keep your cool and work together! \*Hannah Yang
